## Catholic Relief Services Collection March 13-14

LAKE CHARLES -- Over the weekend of the Fourth Sunday of Lent, March 13-14, a more than 65-year tradition will again take place in the parishes of the Diocese of Lake Charles - the Catholic Relief Services Col-

This national collection, known as the American Bishops Overseas Appeal until it was renamed in 2004, supports emergency relief, hudevelopment, peace initiatives around the world while continuing the theme of "Jesus in Disguise," reminding the faithful of the presence of Christ in each of our brothers and sisters in

Organizations that benefit from the CRS Collection include Catholic Relief Services for international relief and development, USCCB Migration and Refugee Services for refugee resettlement, Catholic Legal Immigration Network (CLINIC) for immigration legal services, USCCB Department of Justice, Peace, and Human Development for advocacy, Holy Father's Relief Fund for emergency relief, USCCB Secretariat of Cultural Diversity in the Church for evangelization and min-

Last year in the Diocese of Lake Charles generous contributors made donations totaling \$28,235.82.

Catholic Relief Services, the U.S. Bishop's official international humanitarian organization, has been a leader in recent efforts to assuage the terrible conditions people in Haiti found themselves involved with followthe January earthquake on the island. A special collection, specifically called by Bishop Glen John Provost on January 15-16, to help fund these relief efforts has collected more than \$206,000.00. Catholic schools of the Diocese have also held special events to raise money, awareness of the needs of the survivors of the quake and to provide food, clothing, and personal items lost in the disaster. This non-profit group has sent two ships to the island nation fully loaded with supplies for the survivors and continues to seek additional assistance for the devastated country and its people.


## Church to receive 125 new Catholics at Easter

LAKE CHARLES - One hundred twenty-five catechumens and candidates, in addition to their sponsors, representing 27 parishes of the Diocese of Lake Charles, took part in the Rite of Election and the Celebration of the Call to Continuing Conversion on the First Sunday of Lent, Feb. 21, in the Cathedral of the Immaculate

Conception. The Most Reverend Glen John Provost, Bishop of Lake Charles, received 31 Catechumens who, based on the testimony of godparents and catechists and on the catechumens' reaffirmation of their intention, were judged by the Church ready to continue their advancement toward the sacraments of initiation. This "election" made by the Church is founded on the election by God, in whose name the Church acts. The step is also called the enrollment of names because as a pledge of fidelity the individuals inscribe their names in the book that lists those who have been chosen for initiation. Following the introduction of the catechumens to Bishop Provost, he affixed his signature to the Book of the Elect.

The Bishop also was introduced to 94 candidates, who publicly acknowledged their readiness to be received into full Communion with the Church.

At the Easter Vigil in their home parishes, the Elect will take part in the Sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist while the Candidates will celebrate Confirmation and Eucharist.





# Billboards display priestly ministries in Year for Priests

LAKE CHARLES – Twenty-five billboards, featuring eight different images of priests of the Diocese of Lake Charles serving in various aspects of their ministries with the theme "In Service to ONE, In Service to All", can now be seen throughout the five civil parishes making up the Diocese.

This marks the third year that the Office of Evangelization, headed by Mrs. Bernell Ezell, has orchestrated the use of display boards alongside roadways throughout Southwest Louisiana publicizing the special years of the Church.

"We did four designs for the Year of the Eucharist," Mrs. Ezell said. "Then last year, we also had four for the Year of St. Paul. Now, during this Year for Priests, which Pope Benedict XVI called last June, we have eight different designs.

"There will be a total of 25 sites for the boards," she continued. "Thirteen were put up during February and 12 additional locations will be added in March."

Among other spots around Southwest Louisiana, examples of the billboards are located at the corner of 15th Street and Ryan Street as well as at the corner of Nelson Road and Prien Lake Road and on Common Street near Petro Bowl.

According to Ezell, the initial idea for the project came from members of her Evangelization Core Committee.

"They were very fired up and wanted a way to express the importance of the Year of the Eucharist," she said. "They came up with the idea of putting messages on the boards along with Scripture verses and related artwork. Last year with the Year of St. Paul, we added images of St. Paul and Pauline verses. This year we want to show the various aspects of the priests doing their ministry.

"The images on the boards are symbolic of the many ways priests serve the many and the one," Mrs. Ezell said. "Even though the Year for Priests ends on June 19, there is still ample time to support and pray for our priests."

In his call for the Year for Priests, Pope Benedict XVI declared St. John Vianney, who was previously regarded as the patron of parish priests, as the Universal Patron of Priests, on the occasion of the 150th anniversary of the death of the saint, June 19, 2009.

The Holy Father called for the Year for Priests "to deepen the commitment of all priests to interior renewal for the sake of a more forceful and incisive witness to the Gospel in today's world" (Letter "Proclaiming a Year for Priests", June 16, 2009).

In an open letter to the priests of the Diocese of Lake Charles, Bishop Glen John Provost noted "When our Holy Father, Pope Benedict XVI, called for this year, he did not intend it to be a celebration of 'priest appreciation.' Rather, he wanted it to be a year of deep renewal of the interior life of all priests. Without spiritual renewal, we are dead. Where would we be without prayer, without the spiritual nourishment of the sacraments and the conversation with God that allows us a glimpse into His will for us?"

The Bishop also pointed out the commonality between St. John Vianney and St. Peter Claver, the patron of the Diogeographics.

"These two great priests had much in common, but one feature stands out amongst the rest. In striving to be 'all things to all,' they manifested the priestly character," Bishop Provost said. "There is much that could be said about the legacy of St. John Vianney, but of his life one thing is sure. He embraced his duties with complete zeal and did so because he loved. In his own remarkable words: 'Were we to fully realize what a priest is on earth, we would die: not of
