



## Deacons Starkovich and Huckaby ordained for Diocese

LAKE CHARLES – The Most Reverend Glen John Provost, Bishop of Lake Charles, ordained Jeffrey Starkovich and John Huckaby, both seminarians for the Diocese, to the Diaconate during the Eucharistic Liturgy at Our Lady Queen of Heaven, Sept. 9. The ordination as transitional deacons brings Deacon Starkovich and Deacon Huckaby one step closer to the culmination of their vocation journey to priestly ordination.

The Liturgy was attended by a large crowd of family and friends of the pair. Abbot Justin Brown, O.S.B., who leads the monks of St. Benedict Abbey in Covington and Very Rev. José I. Lavastida, President Rector of Notre Dame Seminary in New Orleans along with priests and deacons of the Diocese of Lake Charles were also present for the occasion.

Concelebrating the Liturgy, in addition to Abbot Justin and Father Lavastida, were Father Nathan Long, Father Charles McMillin, Father Marcus Johnson, Father Aubrey Guilbeau, Father Herbert May and Father Daniel Torres.

Father Torres and Father McMillin assisted the newly ordained deacons with vesting in their dalmatic and stole.

In his homily, Bishop Provost spoke to the men about being in love with Jesus and the commitment they were embarking upon.

“What does it mean to be in love with Jesus,” Bishop Provost said. “When we have a friend, we commit ourselves. The commitment is based upon our desire to love what the friend loves. We remove from our lives all that obstructs the love of the friend.”

Continuing, the Bishop noted, “All that pertains to love is highly personal and for a minister of the Gospel your love for Christ must be deeply personal. The very unity of the Church, of which the hierarchy is one of its manifestations, is an expression of the identity of Jesus Christ. We are to remain in His love because His very credibility will depend upon our unity with him and with one

another.

“The unity of the Body is our responsibility in the ministry of the Church: ‘one Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God and Father of all’ whether we are ‘apostles,’ ‘prophets,’ ‘evangelists,’ ‘pastors,’ or ‘teachers,’” the Bishop said. “You are part of a great continuum of the Incarnation presence. Love is to be made flesh, not just anyone’s love, but Jesus’ love that you bring to those who love.”

He later spoke to them about their ministry as deacons.

“Your response in ministry must be prompt, your liturgical style dignified and prayerful, your homilies well-prepared and thoughtful, and your behavior beyond reproach,” Bishop Provost said. “The dignity of the office requires it, yes, but the love of Christ compels us from within to act accordingly. Love that is true love, will rise to the surface and reflect its presence in the small as well as the great gestures of human activity.”

Closing his homily the Bishop said, “Be a friend to Jesus first, then bring Jesus to others. Let others see Jesus in you and let their hearts burn as you speak. Let them encounter Jesus ‘ever anew.’”

Deacon Starkovich returned for his final year at the North American College in Rome the day after his ordination while Deacon Huckaby will remain at St. Henry Catholic Church until mid-October when returns to Notre Dame Seminary in New Orleans to complete his theological studies.

Following the ordination, a reception for the new deacons, their families and friends was held in the Msgr. Irving A. DeBlanc Family Life Center.

## Boston Auxiliary Bishop to preach at Red Mass, Oct. 15

LAKE CHARLES – The Most Reverend Glen John Provost will be the celebrant of the annual Red Mass at 8:30 a.m. Friday, Oct. 15, in the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception. The Most Reverend Robert Hennessey, Auxiliary Bishop of the Archdiocese of Boston, will be the homilist. Judges, attorneys and government officials from the five civil parishes that make up the Diocese of Lake Charles – Calcasieu, Cameron, Allen, Beauregard and Jefferson Davis – are invited to attend.

The local St. Thomas More Society, Judge Henry Yelverton Chapter is the sponsor. The Mass is so named because of the color of the vestments worn by the Bishop and priests, donned in symbolism of the tongues of fire that descended on the Apostles. Additionally, Judges of the High Court of England and all doctors of law wore red robes or academic hoods.

The Red Mass is celebrat-

ed at the opening of the judicial year and requests guidance from the Holy Spirit for all who seek justice and offers the opportunity to reflect on Catholics believe is the God-given power and responsibility of all in the legal profession.

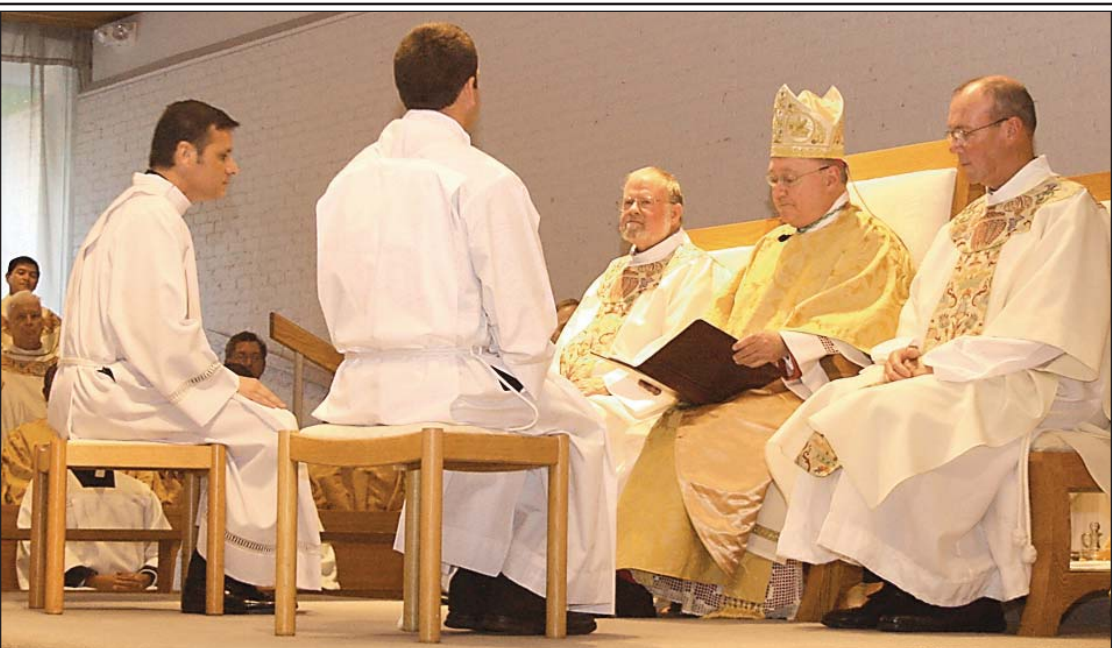

Mass was celebrated in the Cathedral of Paris in 1245. From there, it spread to most European countries. Around 1310, during the reign of Edward II, the tradition began in England. It was attended at the opening of each term of Court by all members of the Bench and Bar. The event gradually fell out of fashion until 1931, when Sydney became the first English-speaking city to re-institute the practice. The first Red Mass held in the United States was celebrated in St. Andrew’s Church in New York City, near the courthouses of Foley Square.

Bishop Hennessey was born in South Boston and studied at St. John’s Seminary. He was ordained to the diaconate in 1977 and to the priesthood by Humberto Cardinal Medeiros in 1978, appointed as Auxiliary Bishop of Boston in 2006.

## Called2BCatholic Youth Festival: A continuing success

LAKE CHARLES –The 2010 Called 2B Catholic Youth Festival was a nearly unqualified success, according to Milissa Thibodeaux, Director of the Office of Youth and Young Adult Ministry, the event’s sponsor. The fourth event of its kind in the past five years - Hurricane Rita forced the cancellation in 2008 - drew nearly 600 people.

“Everything was good,” Thibodeaux said. “The two breakout sessions were very well received. They provided topics for parents, teens only, young adults – something for nearly everyone. People loved it.”

“There was always this kind of “substance” in the other years, but this time we closed down the music stage and almost everyone went to the breakout sessions,” she

continued. “The adoration chapel was the only activity continuing during the two sessions.”

This year’s event was held at St. Louis Catholic High School, a change from the previous three events. Thibodeaux, who is already working on plans for the fifth Called2BCatholic next year, liked the new venue. The first three years had been staged on Freshman campus of Sulphur High School.

“One of the comments about last year’s event was that it seemed the venue was too big for the crowd,” Thibodeaux said. “This year it was great, just right. We weren’t as spread out as we were in Sulphur.”

Besides the breakout sessions, another new part of the day was the Eucharistic Procession from the school to the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception for the closing Mass, celebrated by Bishop Glen John Provost. A group of about 300 to 350 people took part in the procession, which traveled from the school down Bank Street, Reid Street, and Kirby Street before reaching the Cathedral. The mile-long route, which took about 40 minutes for all participants to complete, was overseen by deputies from the Ward 3 Marshall’s Office.

“It was really good,” she said. “We had people coming out of the houses along the route. There was a lot of witnessing going on.

It is something we would like to do again, though if we could do it later in the day it would be better, I think. That way it could be candlelit.

“We even had a lady in a wheelchair and several women with strollers who took part,” Thibodeaux said. The Cathedral was standing room only as many people had made their way there in other ways.

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## Service to Local and Universal Church recognized at Vespers

LAKE CHARLES – The Most Reverend Glen John Provost, Bishop of Lake Charles, presided over Solemn Vespers honoring the Patron Saint of the Diocese, Saint Peter Claver, on Sunday, Sept. 12 in the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception. Bishop Provost also honored 92 individuals with a variety of Papal and Diocesan honors for outstanding service to the Local Church and the Holy See.

Saint Peter Claver, born in 1581 in Catalonia, Spain, joined the Jesuits at age 20. His friendship with St. Alphonsus Rodriguez, the college's doorkeeper, set him on course for the Americas to spread the Word of God in the missions. He arrived in Colombia in 1610 and worked diligently among the African slaves until his death in 1654. Saint Peter Claver was canonized in 1888 by Pope Leo XIII and was proclaimed Patron of all the Catholic missions among people of African descent in 1896.

"Peter Claver worked tirelessly in the seventeenth century to ensure that the Gospel of Christ was preached to poor slaves," Bishop Provost said in his homily. "He made himself all things to his flock, which were the most destitute and downtrodden. He was a priest who saw that in baptizing the slaves, Christ would give them a dignity that they had not had before and a dignity that would in some way, perhaps, assist them to be treated better under the laws that governed Spain and its possessions at that time."

Speaking directly to those who were to be honored, Bishop Provost said, "We find ourselves, dear friends, this evening the beneficiary of 30 years of preaching and the ministration of the sacraments of Christ celebrating the diocese of lake Charles and recognizing men and women who within our living memory have helped make the Catholic Church what it is in our area. To you we say thank you.

"Each and every one of you has given yourself to the Church in some way. There is no sense of entitlement here, and should not be," the

Bishop continued. "We do not do what we do for recognition. Instead, we do it to fulfill that reading from the Sermon on the Mount, from Matthew 5:16, when our Lord says to his disciples 'your light must shine before others, that they may see your good works, and glorify your heavenly Father.' This is why we are here and this is why we are recognizing your contribution
