



# Bishop's Golf Classic October 7

LAKE CHARLES – The Annual Bishop's Golf Classic will be Friday, October 7 at the Lake Charles Country Club.

The event provides funding for the Seminarian Education and Priest Retirement Funds. Title sponsors for the event are Iberia Bank and Alfred Palma Contractors while Bubba Oustalet serves as a banner sponsor.

The four-person scramble will have two shotgun starts, 8 a.m. and 1:30 p.m. Cost is \$125 per individual or \$500 a team. The cost of educating the men who are studying for the priesthood for the Diocese of Lake Charles is an expensive task. Seven men are currently in various stages of their education and discernment, attending four different seminaries.

This year the cost of tuition and fees for these men will be more than \$200,000. The

continued diligent work of Bishop Glen John Provost, Msgr. Daniel Torres (Director of Vocations and Seminarians) and the vocation recruiters to seek men who are discerning a vocation as a diocesan priest bears fruit. Three men have started their first year of seminary study. The opening of Vianney House, a house of discernment, has seen three more men begin a year-long process of prayer and serious consideration about how the Holy Spirit might be calling them to the priesthood. More seminarians in the future mean additional funds will be needed for their education and training.

The Diocese provides 55 percent of a seminarian's educational cost at the college/philosophy level with the student responsible for the remainder, which may be paid through grants and loans. At the theological seminary the Diocese obligates itself to pay 100 percent of the educational costs.

At the opposite end of priestly life is the retired priest. We must see to the care and welfare of these men who have given their lives to spreading the Gospel message in the faith communities of Southwest Louisiana. Currently 10 men, nine priests and our Bishop-emeritus, are in this category.

The Diocese will expend nearly \$300,000 on the welfare of these wonderful and holy men during this fiscal year. The depth of their sacrifice to the Faith is reason enough to aid them for the remainder of their days. A number of other priests are close to retirement age and for others, health is a question mark. The number of retirees will continue to grow and, thus, the need to aid these men in their golden years will only increase.

## Bells to toll, silent prayers asked on 9/11 anniversary

LAKE CHARLES – The Most Reverend Glen John Provost, Bishop of Lake Charles, has asked pastors and administrators of the churches of the Diocese of Lake Charles to take part in a commemoration of the events of 9/11 on the 10th anniversary of that dreadful day. He has requested that all of the churches in the Diocese ring their bells at noon and that parishioners be invited to join in silent prayer, recalling the lives lost on that tragic morning.

"On this anniversary of the tragedy of 9/11, we pray for the eternal rest of those

who perished and for consolation to those who mourn," Bishop Provost said, "May God grant our country and the world peace and protect us from acts of terrorism."

The Bishop's request is in response to the call by Archbishop Timothy Dolan of New York and President of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops for such commemoration and remembrance in all dioceses in the United States. In New York City, this will occur on Sunday, Sept. 11 at 1 p.m. EDT, when church bells will toll and all will observe a moment of prayerful silence.

O Virgin, Star of the Sea, Our Beloved Mother, we ask you to plead with your Son in our behalf, so that spared from the calamities common to this area and animated with a true spirit of gratitude, we will walk in the footsteps of your Divine Son to reach the heavenly Jerusalem where a stormless eternity awaits us. 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## Celebration of Diocesan Patron Sunday, Sept. 11

LAKE CHARLES - On Sunday, Sept. 11, a Vespers (Evening Prayer) Service in honor of Saint Peter Claver, Patron of the Diocese of Charles, will be held in the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception beginning at 6 p.m., with The Most Reverend Glen John Provost, Bishop of Lake Charles, presiding.

Saint Peter Claver was chosen as the Patron Saint of the Diocese by its first Bishop, The Most Reverend Jude Speyer. The Diocese is privileged to have a first class relic of Saint Peter Claver, which will be on display for veneration at this service.

Saint Peter Claver was born near Barcelona in modern day Spain in 1580; he joined the Society of Jesus, commonly called the Jesuits. After being influenced by Saint Alphonsus Rodriguez, Peter decided he wanted to be a missionary to what was then known as "The New World".

To that end, he continued his studies and was sent to the then called "New Granada" or modern day Colombia and was ordained at Carta-

gena in 1615. Cartagena was the principal center of the African slave trade and Peter Claver spent his life trying to alleviate the horrible conditions of the slaves. He worked among the slaves in the yards where they were penned and ministered to them with food and medicine. He was able to baptize some three thousand persons in the course of his forty years of ministry. However, his ministry did not just concern the souls of these unfortunates.

Peter Claver would visit the plantations and plead with owners of these slaves to improve their conditions of life and work. During these visits, he actually lodged with the slaves. In addition to his ministry to the slaves, Peter Claver visited the imprisoned and the lepers. He was known as a great preacher and led a very austere life; he is reputed to have possessed supernatural gifts including that of prophecy, miracles and the ability to read the hearts and minds of people.

In 1650, he was stricken with a plague that beset Cartagena but he did not neglect his duties even when mortally ill. He died on September 8 and was canonized in 1888. Pope Leo XIII named him the patron of all missionary activities to African-Americans. His feast day is September 9.

Since Bishop Speyer's choice of Peter Claver as Diocesan Patron, his feast has been observed annually. Normally, the celebration is observed on the Sunday nearest to the actual feast day thus allowing more of the faithful to attend.

## Collection for Africa drought response September 10-11

LAKE CHARLES - The parishes of the Diocese of Lake Charles have been asked to respond to the urgent need to provide assistance to the millions of needy individuals suffering through drought conditions in Africa, according to Father Wayne LeBleu, Diocesan Director for Catholic Relief Services, recently informed the pastors of the tremendous need. A second collection for this relief effort has been urged to be taken up in the Diocese on the weekend of Sept. 10-11.

Archbishop Timothy M. Dolan, president of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB), and Bishop Gerald F. Kicanas, chairman of the Board of Catholic Relief Services (CRS), asked their brother bishops to encourage pastors and parishioners to support emergency relief efforts in the Horn of Africa, possibly by taking up a second collection.

More than 12 million people are in need of urgent humanitarian assistance in Kenya, Somalia and Ethiopia because of what

many are calling the worst drought in decades. This severe lack of rainfall has resulted in failed crops, deaths of livestock and critical shortages in food and water.

"Every day we are seeing more and more heartbreaking news about the drought and famine in Somalia and the eastern parts of Africa. We see millions of people being forced from their homes, leaving behind what meager possessions they had, and walking for days over rough terrain," wrote Archbishop Dolan and Bishop Kicanas.

CRS has worked in East Africa for decades, and is on the ground responding to this emergency. In Ethiopia, CRS is expanding its food distribution program to 1.1 million people and is working closely with local partners to provide livelihood support, water and sanitation. In Somalia, CRS is sup-

porting local partners to assist highly vulnerable, displaced families with basic necessities, such as food packages, support to clinics, therapeutic feeding and shelter. In Kenya, CRS is working both to assist newly-arrived refugees with hygiene, sanitation promotion and protection, and also to provide water, sanitation and supplemental feeding to drought-affected Kenyan communities.

"Bishop Provost expressed his desire for our Diocese to take up a special collection to assist those in need in Africa during this difficult time. Catholic Relief Services is developing a response to be used for the immediate humanitarian needs of the most vulnerable and to support the local Catholic Church in its ongoing mission," Father LeBleu said.
