Diocesan Capital Campaign details are announced

LAKE CHARLES - The Diocese of Lake Charles announced new details of its landmark capital campaign at the Bishop's Gala last Saturday, December 12. The diocesan-wide Return to the Lord Capital Campaign, the first in the history of the diocese, is an effort to raise \$16 million to support priests, parishes, and faith ministries. Campaign Theme

Bishop Glen John Provost came up with the campaign theme. "When I arrived in Lake Charles a little over eight years ago, many shared with me that they were passionate about wanting to do more to grow in their faith. It comes from Psalm 116: 'How can I make a return to the Lord for all the good He has done for me?' The theme touches on that importance to have our actions match our heart. We can do so by giving back and meeting the needs of our parishes and our ministries.'

Campaign Goals

The campaign will primarily help grow the investment endowments of the diocese's Priest Retirement Fund and Seminarian Education Fund. Both will receive twenty percent of campaign proceeds, or \$3.2 million respectively. Twenty percent of all funds raised during the campaign will be returned to every parish in the diocese to address specific needs.

The campaign is also raising \$2.4 million (15 percent) to begin a much needed and long delayed restoration project at the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception, \$1.6 million (10 percent) to build and operate a new youth program initiative of Saint Charles Center, and \$800,000 (5 percent) to expand Catholic Charities' services. Ten percent will be used to help run the campaign and be set aside for unfulfilled intentions. Deacon Glen Bertrand, Director of the Stewardship and Development Office for the diocese, said more details of the campaign goals will be shared when the campaign officially starts in the Spring of 2016.

Parish Benefits

Each parish in the diocese has a specific monetary goal they are trying to meet. The parish goals are 125 percent of the average of the past threeyear's offertory.

"They (goals) are not unreasonable and they are not assessments," said Father Keith Pellerin. "Parishioners will be asked to think about making a commitment over a three-year pledge period and they may also decide which elements of the campaign they really want to support."

Father Pellerin noted that the Pastor Advisory Council had discussed and agreed to recommend an 80/20 split initially in the campaign where 80 percent goes to the diocese and 20 percent of what each parish raises is returned to the parish. Then, once the parish goal is accomplished for the campaign prior to the end of three years, the campaign funds raised after goal will then switch to 80 percent to the parish and 20 percent to the diocese. For each parish, those funds will go to meeting their own individual needs that their pastor and parish leadership will decide. "The Pastor Advisory Council knows and the Bishop recognizes that every parish has projects which have been on our to-do list for some time," he said. "It is nice to rely on the campaign as a means to accomplish our diocesan goals and, at the same time, reinvigorate our parishes."

historic effort. Bishop Provost appointed a nine-member Pastor Advisory Committee to assist him in the campaign, providing guidance, helping set campaign policies and procedures, determine goal allocations and be his primary source for advice during the effort.

"Right now, we are focused on preparing for the campaign and everything related to doing that," said Deacon Bertrand. "That includes getting communication material prepared, scheduling events and providing information about the goals to pastors and parish staff. We will do all of that first, before we begin to ask parishioners for gifts and pledges." The parishes will run the campaign in 2016. The diocese will formally announce the start of the campaign and provide more details at that time.

A number of diocesan prolife ministries, including Rachel's Vineyard; The Gabriel Project, and youth pilgrims traveling to the annual March for Life gathering in Washington DC, are benefitted by the proceeds from this event.

According to Rickard Newman, Director of the Office of Pro Life of the Diocese, the basis of the awards is found in Pope Francis' Apostolic Exhortation Evangelii Gaudium. Nominations came from the pastors of each parish. Final recommendations were made by a committee following study of the nominees.

"In the Exhortation, the Holy Father lists a number of the message in practice.

"It is our intention to honor men and women who have done this, not only speaking about the importance of the pro-life message of the Church but who have made it part of their own lives by their activities," Newman continued.

International Run Carrera Antorcha Guadalupana



The annual Torch Run linking Mexico and the United States came through the Diocese of Lake Charles, Nov. 8-9 making overnight stops at St. Henry Catholic Church in Lake Charles and Immaculate Conception Catholic Church in Jennings. The Holy Fire, along with oversized images of Our Lady of Guadalupe and St. Juan Diego, were en route from the Basilica of Our Lady of Guadalupe in Mexico City to St. Patrick's Cathedral in New York City for Our Lady's feast day last Saturday.
